Have you ever thought, "How do I fit Jesus into this conversation?"

When we feel "awkward" fitting Jesus into conversations, I believe we need a retrain of our brain.

Over the years I have spoken with many people who profess to believe in Jesus yet have "difficulty-fitting" Jesus into conversations. They say, "Pastor Tim, it's not my job, or my gift, or my calling and I'm not made that way." If we can fit Jesus into conversation then He must be able to be kept out of conversation. More clearly stated if He's not in. He must be out!

Is this possibly why so many believers feel in and out of touch with Jesus?

Let me ask another question. What makes God great?

Is it because in His great **love** He sent Jesus to the cross, shed His blood, died and rose again in three days? Was it because in His great **love** that He created a way for salvation through Jesus? Is it possible that our great action-adventure-story of salvation makes God great or greater and, would our non-acceptance of God makes Him any less great?

Or is it possible that God's greatness does not come from anything He has done and it is simply because **He is GOD**?

Man's standard of greatness is defined by "what someone does" and God's standard is by "Whom He is.....The Great I AM, GOD ALMIGHTY!"

When we see that God is great before any beginning, because He has no beginning, "Jesus will be our every conversation!"

If sharing Jesus is awkward, ask yourself this question, "Is Jesus Christ my everything and is God great because He Is GOD?

When I say Jesus is MY everything, I mean everything. So much so that I can't let a moment go by without praising and thanking Him for *Who He is,* not so much for *what He's done.* If it's because of what He's done, then I get to determine His importance and if for some reason He doesn't measure up to or do what I think He should have done, *I'll leave Him out of my conversations*.

If I haven't been rescued from the magnitude penalty of sin, totally being rescued from eternal separation from God in Hell with Satan and all the fallen angels, then no wonder why it would be so difficult to share the reality of Jesus as seen in **John 3:16** and 17 and 18. He will always be awkward to share and will have to be "fit into a conversation," instead of "Jesus being the conversation."

The problem is that we see sin as candy, kind of tempting instead of as cancer-which kills! Thanks Pastor Landon for sharing that comparison with us.
